STEFANO ADAMO is Assistant Professor of Italian Culture and Chair of the Italian Studies program at the University of Banja Luka, in Bosnia and Herzegovina. His academic interests lie at the intersection between culture and economics, which he addresses by studying how economic ideas are construed and disseminated in cultural productions such as narratives, films, and dramas. He has published in peer-reviewed journals of intellectual history, interdisciplinary studies, and literary studies alike. Some of his papers have appeared on *Strumenti critici, Modern Italy, Italian Quarterly,* and *Rivista di storia economica*.

CARLO BAGHETTI obtained a joint PhD (co-tutelle) from the Universities of Aix-Marseille and "La Sapienza" of Rome. His studies mostly focus on the representation of work in Italian literature. He is also the co-founder of the OB.E.R.T. (Observatoire Européen des Récits du Travail). He is currently a lecturer at the Italian department of the University of Aix-Marseille.

ALESSANDRO CETERONI (PhD, Università di Macerata, 2016) is Graduate Assistant of Italian Literary and Cultural Studies at the University of Connecticut. His book *La letteratura aziendale. Gli scrittori che raccontano il precariato, le multinazionali e il nuovo mondo del lavoro* examines Italian literary works from 1995 to 2015 that focused on the workforce and the job market. He is working on a research project on literary representations of working women in the Mediterranean area.

ROBERTO LAPIA is a PhD student at the University of Paris Nanterre with a thesis on contemporary Sardinian literature. Some of his articles have appeared in *Narrativa*, *Chroniques italiennes* and *Cahiers d'études romanes*.

BIANCA RITA CATALDI is a PhD candidate and Italian tutor at the School of Languages, Cultures and Linguistics of University College Dublin. The title of her thesis is «Utopia and labour: The impact of European utopian thought on Italian industrial literature», with a particular focus on Adriano Olivetti's utopia. Her contributions have appeared in "Incroci: Semestrale di letteratura e altre scritture" and in "Incontri. Rivista Europea di Studi Italiani". She is now a resident scholar and PhD representative at UCD Humanities Institute and a postgraduate representative for SIS (Society of Italian Studies).

DANIELE FORLINO has taught Italian in the department of World Languages and Literatures at Southern Methodist University (Dallas, Texas) since 2017. He has a Ph.D. in Italian from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, with a specialization in twentieth-century Italian literature and cinema.

MASSIMILIANO CAPPELLO is a second year PhD student at University of Milan. His doctoral research focuses specifically on three 20th century Italian poets/essayists' non-fictional production – i.e. Andrea Zanzotto, Giovanni Giudici, and Giovanni Raboni.

NICOLÁS SÁNCHEZ is a Ph.D. candidate in Latin American Studies at Duke University. His research interests include 19th-21st centuries Latin American Literature and Culture, Economics and Literature, Marxism and Critical Theory, Biopolitics, and Decolonial Studies. His current research analyzes from a historical perspective four financial instruments – stocks, bonds, bills of exchange, and paper money – and the mediation of their value performed by economic and literary texts. He is also working on a project on the relation between logistics, finance, and extractivism under neoliberalism.

He works on the representation of violence in contemporary Italian literature, literary theory and the relationship between literature and ethics.
